



Nevertheless, the challenges that emerged with Covid demonstrate how both the concept of international cooperation and that of sustainability are essential for building a safer future. This applies in healthcare and more than ever from the economic and social points of view.

Said perspective makes us better understand the choices of the European Union (which in the EU Budget 2021-2027, among the various measures, endows the Neighborhood and International Cooperation and Development Instrument with 79.5 billion euros) or the World Bank who has already made it known that the sustainability (environmental, economic and social) of projects and works will be a basic requirement for obtaining funding or carrying out works.

Precisely for this reason and to achieve the objectives contained in the 2030 Agenda, today more than in the past, it becomes essential for the profit and non-profit sectors to find a common language and a common ground to coordinate and hybridize their interactions.

Agriculture and hunger: why the development of agriculture in Africa affects the entire planet.

In view of the recent ratification of the Africa Continental Free Trade Area (AfCTA), which potentially makes Africa the largest free trade area in the world, the continent's agri-food sector has attracted the attention of global investors. African agriculture produces a variety of products in demand globally, including cocoa from the Ivory Coast and Ghana, tea from Kenya, maize and rice from Nigeria, vanilla from Madagascar and fruit from South Africa, to name a few.

However, the regulation of this sector cannot be left to the market alone since the development of the African agri-food sector has the potential to have an impact on the entire planet. Just look at the numbers: the sector on the continent is projected to reach a trade value of \$ 1 trillion by 2030, Africa is home to 60% of the world's uncultivated arable land, and its productivity represents only about 10% of the world agricultural production. About three-quarters of Africans depend on agriculture for their livelihoods, and over 30% of the continent's income, as well as significant amounts of export and employment income, comes from agri-industry and agribusiness. Developing these activities towards growth will not only increase revenues for countries, but also lift many rural citizens out of poverty, creating jobs across the continent. This is a decidedly vital element, since it is expected that young Africans will make up a quarter of the world workforce by 2050. It is equally important to guide African agricultural development so that it follows virtuous and sustainable paths, for the environment and health.

The change must go beyond the simple cultivation of the land and towards the production of products with significant added value, primarily intended for the African market. Just to give an example, 90 percent of the total income of African coffee goes to the countries of consumption, only to a residual extent to the countries where it is grown.
